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EU Preparedness on future migration flows

CONCEPT

Establishing a comprehensive European approach for migration management forms one of the key elements of the Presidency of the Council of the European Union trio of Germany, Portugal and Slovenia (1 July 2020 - 31 December 2021). The need to continually improve the efficiency, effectiveness and quality of migration management systems, better forecast migration flows, and adapt to change has been the on-going focus of efforts of EU and national policymakers, also in light of continued irregular migration flows - despite the COVID-19 pandemic. Against this background, the EU is currently developing structured response mechanisms, including the exploration of possible tools to better forecast migration flows. New developments include both technological, in the form of artificial intelligence (AI) and digitalisation, and in policy, at EU and national level. The EU Pact on Migration and Asylum,¹ launched in September 2020, aims to support the building of a system 'that manages and normalises migration for the long term and which is fully grounded in European values and international law'. Acknowledging that the EU must be prepared to address crisis situations with resilience and flexibility, the Pact introduces the new Migration Preparedness and Crisis Blueprint,² which will mobilise existing crisis management tools and bring together key actors³,

operational and financial measures and protocols to ensure preparedness at EU and national level. Such information management and improved coordination mechanisms will serve as fundamental principles in strengthening EU migration management systems.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, both the number of irregular border crossings and asylum applications lodged in EU Member States decreased in 2020 compared to previous years. However, data for the first semester of 2021 indicate that these trends are reversing, with the number of illegal border crossings reaching over 82 000 in the first seven months of 2021, 59% more than the total from a year ago.⁴ The total number of applications for international protection lodged in the EU in June 2021 were the highest since the outbreak of COVID-19 but still remained below the pre-pandemic level.⁵

In this context, this conference will focus particularly on EU preparedness in relation to asylum and irregular migration flows, bringing together relevant European and national stakeholders to discuss current developments, existing and possible future forecasting tools to predict migratory flows, as well as the role of the EU Agencies in this area.

AIMS AND OVERVIEW OF THE EVENT

This conference aims to explore new concepts around migration management, gaining insights from EU Member States, EU agencies, and third-country perspectives. Keynote speakers and panellists will present a timely assessment of the latest developments on EU preparedness and understanding future migration flows in the field, including the use of AI and biometric borders. Participants will be given the opportunity to learn about innovative policies and practices in relation to asylum and irregular migration flows and will be invited to pose questions and to join in with the discussion.

The conference will take place on 5-6 October 2021 and will be covered in four panels of approximately one hour each in length. Depending on the epidemiological situation, the event will take place either as a webinar, or as a face-to-face conference. The content will remain the same irrespective of the format of the event.

Keynote speakers, including the Minister of the Interior of the Republic of Slovenia, and the European Commissioner for Home Affairs will open the event and set the scene. The first panel will open by locating the latest developments within the Western Balkans context. The second panel will then explore the specifics of technological innovations in the migration context, such as the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) to forecast migration flows and their expected impacts on future migration management. The third panel will assess EU preparedness around the reception and return of migrants and will include key actors involved with the implementation of the Migration Preparedness and Crisis Blueprint, in the form of a facilitated discussion to gain a rounded perspective on upcoming changes. The final panel will provide an overview of new governance schemes for migration management across borders, including perspectives, policies and practices from EU and third countries, and will include perspectives on the fundamental rights impacts of these developments.
